

# THE FAAN BUILDING COMMITTEE

The Building Committee has been working steadily since we purchased the land in Tarqui to secure all permits and create a design for Phase One of the Shelter. This includes not only the architectural design following modern shelter standards, but the sourcing of materials locally and looking for ways to reduce our initial building costs through both donated materials and labor, eco sustainable materials, and even the potential use of shipping containers for outbuildings.

We are racing the clock with El Nino i.e. past and potential new landslides at the upper shelter combined with imminent eviction from our landlord who has provided a temporary extension from our original December 31st deadline. We are hoping we have until April 1 between the landlord discussions and raising needed funds so that when we move the dogs, we will move them to the modern shelter, we envisioned. We have also prepared the dogs for their re-location with complete grooming and flea treatments.

Phase one includes shelter and runs for 150 dogs, a kitchen, storage area, bathroom, caretaker and meeting/adoption space with an enrichment area for the dogs. There is fencing and other pieces of infrastructure being put in place as well.

Barry Rein, Shelter Design Committee Chair notes we need approximately \$50,000 in additional funding to complete phase one of the shelter project. Can we do it? According to Barry without a doubt! “No one thought we could possibly raise funds to purchase the permanent land for FAAN’s dogs and yet we did it within 12 months. Never underestimate the love and generosity of animal lovers who both live in Cuenca and/or have visited our World Heritage City and love it.

We hope you will consider joining us as a founding member of the new shelter through the Paws Benefactor Circle with your donation from \$100 - \$5,000 +.

# SO THERE'S THIS DOG...

ANIMAL SHELTERS AREN'T THE FIRST SOLUTION



FAAN sat down with John Olson and Yapa Tree to discuss what to do if you see a dog in distress or come across a dog or dogs in your neighborhood.

Read John's Article and of course, celebrate with us the very happy ending for the author when he followed the intervention steps that were recommended. Hint: Her name is STELLA!!!

Many folks don't realize that an animal shelter is often the last resort in most instances; FAAN has strict protocols and other interventions used when we receive calls about an abandoned dog. As you'll read in John's article, many dogs are not abandoned but are roaming or community dogs, quite different from the US or European countries.

According to the FAAN Advisory Board "Individual responsibility becomes key and we work with caring community members who can follow the guidance of assessing and photographing the situation, bringing a dog in distress to a vet (FAAN has discounts with specific vets we work with) and potentially fostering while we advertise the dog for adoption. We also report cases of abuse."

Most shelters in Cuenca as in most of Latin America are at total capacity, so the answer lies not in warehousing dogs but in prevention along with intervention strategies. This includes spaying and neutering campaigns, building a culture of adoption and community education such as FAAN's "Be Kind Campaign and Curriculum".

FAAN's strategic plan includes a holistic approach to animal welfare in Cuenca providing both the new, modern, animal shelter with proven prevention and intervention strategies.


## WHAT CAN YOU DO WITH AN EMOTIONALLY REACTIVE DOG?

I know what you're going to say, those who can do, those who can't teach. I'm no expert but I have been studying what to do with my rescue, Mr. Peabody. We rescued Mr. Peabody, when we first moved to Ecuador. The first thing we did was re-name him. Barry and I knew immediately he was no "Einstein" but when we answered an ad in Gringo Post, he was very excited to greet us.

His owner explained that she was teaching English online and had to lock the dog away all day while she was teaching; this was not fair to him. That should have been our first clue. When we leave the house now, Mr. Peabody won't leave the door, giving us the stink eye as we dare go without him.

Yet, our soon to be best friend in our adoption meet and greet made a great first impression with soulful eyes and happiness that made us feel like a million bucks.

Fast Forward three years later and Mr. Peabody shakes uncontrollably with any thunder, fireworks and power outages. He still greets all guests and us with tail wagging enthusiasm but quite unexpectedly can turn on the dime with "The Elvis Lip" and a low growl warning everyone he's in no mood. We've had four or five bites, mostly when we have unexpectedly disturbed him. (There is really something to the saying "Let sleeping dogs lie.") and two of our guests have experienced the shock that such a nice boy can go all Cujo.



on the hunt for the reason of Peabody's behavior

In under a minute, Mr. Peabody's behavior is followed by a walk of hound-dog shame and his attempt to lick his way out of trouble. We have and are following these steps in addition to warning all guests that our Elvis may still be in the building.

## Steps to Take with an Emotionally Reactive Dog

1. **Identify Triggers:** Pay attention to what sets off their reactions. Is it certain sounds, sights, people, or other animals? Understanding triggers helps you to manage situations better.
2. **Create a Safe Environment:** Establish a safe space for your dog at home where they can retreat when feeling stressed. This might be a cozy crate or a quiet room.
3. **Positive Reinforcement Training:** Use positive reinforcement techniques to teach your dog new behaviors and responses. Reward calm behavior and gradually expose them to triggers in a controlled, positive way.
4. **Desensitization and Counterconditioning:** Gradually expose your dog to their triggers in a controlled setting while pairing these exposures with positive experiences (like treats or toys) to change their emotional response.
5. **Consistency and Patience:** Consistency in training and patience are key. Progress might be slow, but it's important to remain calm and supportive throughout the process.
6. **Seek Professional Help:** Consult with a certified dog behaviorist or trainer experienced in handling reactive dogs. They can provide personalized guidance and create a tailored training plan.
7. **Reduce Stress:** Ensure your dog gets enough physical exercise, mental stimulation, and proper rest. A tired dog is often a calmer dog.
8. **Use Management Tools:** Tools like head halters, no-pull harnesses, or calming aids (like pheromone diffusers or calming vests) might assist in managing your dog's reactions while training.
9. **Avoid Punishment:** Punishment can increase fear and anxiety in reactive dogs. Focus on positive reinforcement rather than scolding or punishment.
10. **Stay Calm:** Dogs can pick up on your emotions. Stay calm and composed when working with a reactive dog, as your demeanor can influence their reactions.

We have read all the books and are following the intervention process below as well as testing other remedies such as ....

## Possible Relief with a Bull Penis?

We also just picked up a possible remedy from our neighbor and are investing in “Bully Sticks” which you can buy on Amazon with the holder (local number below\*). According to our initial research this occupying doggie treat has nutritional value so we will have to ignore what it actually is. “Dehydrated Bull Penis” So Amazon here we come, although we should be able to get a farmer in Ecuador to make our own Bully Sticks at a fraction of the delicacy/import. Maybe a FAAN profit center? LOL

\*Someone provided a WhatsApp phone number for Bully Sticks locally – 096-325-4233.

\*The American Kennel Club recommends using bully sticks as a safe and healthy treat for your dog. Unlike many other types of dog bones and stick-like treats, bully sticks do not splinter, which eliminates the risk of broken pieces causing internal problems. Note: Do your own research. There are conflicting recommendations that for example caution on the possible underestimation of calories. For us, we decided it’s worth a try to give our boy some relief for his anxiety.

Remember, every dog is unique, and what works for one might not work for another. Tailor your approach based on your dog's personality and needs, but don't hesitate to seek professional help if you're facing challenges.




## VOLUNTEER SPOTLIGHT ANNIKA SCHOETT

The FAAN volunteer team was completely amazed at the number of entries we received to be the face of FAAN's 2023 Wine bottles to benefit the building of the new shelter.


